

MEETING REVIEW

Al and Dave Eicher presented the program "THE ORPHAN TRAINS IN MICHIGAN" at the December meeting. The Guild members and spouses were enthralled. Most of us had never heard of the Orphan Train.

In the mid 1850's through 1927, the New York Children's Aid Society (NYCAS), founded by a preacher named Charles Brace, began rounding up orphaned children from the streets of New York and providing food, shelter, and clothing for them as he tried to place them on farms in the area. This soon became an overwhelming task and the Orphan Train concept was born. Over the years, over 27, 000 children were made available for adoption in several mid-west states. In Michigan, hundreds of children were adopted in over 50 cities from Adrian, Ann Arbor, and Detroit to Menominee, Newaygo, and Marquette.

Although some orphans were placed as laborers and servants, a 1901 a Michigan Historical Society report listed many successful placements resulting in adult professions such as: 19 Clergy, 17 doctors, 22 owned retail stores, 946 were in the military, 26 bankers, 34 lawyers, 2 state governors (North Dakota and Alaska), 81 teachers, and 450 'business men'. One woman from Lapeer (Mae Pierson) was an Orphan Train rider who was adopted by the Pierson family and became the First lady of Michigan in 1948 when her husband, Kim Sigler, became Governor.

MWG Children's Hospital 2016 Toy & Box Program

I would like to thank all guild members who participated in our toy and box program this year. On December 12 our guild delivered 450 wooden toys and 50 boxes which exceeded our goals of 400 boxes and 40 boxes. The Children's Hospital was very appreciative of the donations and the effort by guild members and by Henry Ford II High School who supported our program for the first time this year with 80 toys from their woodworking classes. The school wants to participate again next year and will they will have some returning students with experience to improve their toy building efficiency. It was encouraging to witness the enthusiasm of the students in building their toys despite cutting them out with coping saws and hand sanding the rough surfaces for hours to smooth them.

Although some of our past guild toy builders were unable to participate this year, others stepped up and we again have exceeded our goals. I am especially proud of your performance in donating the quantity of toys and boxes while delivering a high level of quality in both the toys and boxes.

Members who would like to participate for the first time next year can contact me with questions. I can provide our hospital guidelines for toys and the guild will provide the wheels/axles/washers for the toys you donate to the hospital. Current and past contributors which already have the guidelines please let me know your wheel/axle/washer needs. We have had several hundred 2" wheels donated to our program so if you have a design for that size it would be helpful (our current guild patterns use 1", 1.25", and 1.5" wheels only).

Thanks for helping so many children have a brighter holiday season.

Vacuum Cleaners

This one is from my shop, we all have those vacuum cleaners that pick up dust in our shops. They do a go job of the dust pick up, but they also do a go job of blowing dust all




over the shop from the exhaust. I tried using a old pillow case with the one edge trapped by the top and a clamp holding the other side. The trick is to use a pillow case that has been washed at least 82 times.

Squaring Cabinets

-Gluing up and squaring a large carcass is an awkward job, especially when you're working alone. Instead of using clamps diagonally, I cut a piece of MDF the exact size of the opening. I place this in the middle of the carcass, and then I know it has to be square.
