

We will continue to shuffle the venues during the upcoming year, searching for the perfect blend of sites to help to create a maximum amount of interest among the membership.

Our annual holiday meeting featuring Bob Kreipke, will be held at the Livonia Senior Center on December 13 from 2 to 430pm. The Editor's Two Cents By Peter Goddard

Another election season for the Guild has arrived. The final list of candidates, unless modified from the floor during the December meeting, is contained in this newsletter. In addition, a request for input to the website development is also a part of this newsletter. Final status of the 2015 toy program is also detailed. This year the target number of toys was exceeded, but the number of plain boxes was less than the target. I think that all of us in the Guild need to work on supporting the toy program. It is one of the most positive efforts undertaken by the Guild.

Prior to the November meeting, an executive meeting was held. A couple of the items from that meeting may be of general interest. The future of the Guild library is going to be DVD based. The intent is to have the library of DVDs that are available for check out listed on the web site (once completed – mid 2016). Individuals wishing to check out a DVD would so indicate. The DVD itself would be brought to the next Guild meeting. The library would no longer consist of any books. Hard copy books have been found to be too much effort to track and haul back and forth to meetings.

An examination of the newsletter costs indicate that the current cost for a six page newsletter to be printed and mailed is ~\$25. Members having printed copies sent to them every month annually costs the Guild \$5 more than their dues. This is obviously not a sustainable situation. The intent is to move the newsletter to electronic version only starting with the January newsletter. Upon publication, the newsletter will be emailed to all current members with valid email addresses. Once the web site for the Guild is completed, the newsletter will be published to the web site. An email will be generated to all members notifying them of the newsletter's availability when it is published.

October Meeting Review By Peter Goddard

The October 11th Woodworker's Guild meeting was a presentation of jigs and fixtures by a selection of Guild members. In addition to the presentation of the various jigs and fixtures, a swap meet, allowing members to sell or exchange excess tools was held. In previous years, the swap meet was an annual event that occurred in conjunction with the annual picnic. However this year, the swap meet at the picnic was poorly received. Almost no one brought anything to swap. At the October meeting, the swap meet part of the meeting, was quite a bit more successful. Participation in the swap meet exceeded expectations. The main part of the meeting consisted of presentations of individual jigs by members. The jigs and fixtures are too numerous to detail in a meeting summary. However, item generated considerable interest. Ken Wolf brought in a Moxon type vise that was based on the use of a couple ACME screws and some heavy wood vise parts (see back cover). It was immediately apparent that many Guild members found that device potentially useful in their own shops. If you missed November's meeting, you missed some very interesting solutions to problems we all share.

As of November 23, 2015 the Guild membership is 261. As I mentioned in the October article, our high was 370. The biggest reason for this decline is the lack of a really good woodworking show like the ones we used to have at the Novi Expo Center. They would usually generate 20 to 30 new members each (although normally about half of these would not renew the next year.

The other major reason is the aging of the membership. In addition to the number of members who have passed, there are more and more who are moving into facilities that are not large enough to hold a shop.

What is needed is a young, energetic person with new ideas on how to turn this trend around. Luckily, we have just such a person in Ann Ivory. Ann has volunteered to take over the Membership Director's job starting next year. She and I will work together for the next few months until she is comfortable enough to fly solo. 
